ABSTRACT

From the Old Kingdom to the Roman Period, from Mirgissa to the Delta, from individuals to the priests of certain temples and the Egyptian state – execration rituals figure throughout the ancient Egyptian history in every part of the country and presumably also in many different social contexts. In the last century, numerous scholars have dedicated themselves to the study of execration figurines and execration rituals, and yet many questions still remain open. If execration figurines were indeed to be destroyed in every execration ritual as a rule, then why are so many of them still preserved, frequently even in an intact condition? How did the figurines and the ritual evolve during the long time span of its documented existence? How can we account for the fact that according to the execration texts, the ritual was directed against living foreign enemies and deceased Egyptian individuals at the same time?

The aim of this workshop is to bring together specialists in the field of ancient Egyptian execration figurines and ritual(s) in order to address these and other questions and shed light on some of the fundamental aspects of the ritual which are still in need of discussion. For this purpose, the workshop will be divided in two parts. The first part consists of lectures given by the participants, with a special focus on the material, archaeological and textual evidence of the ritual and the figurines. In the second part, we will have the opportunity to discuss certain issues on the basis of the previous lectures, such as the questions mentioned above, the adequacy of the current terminology, as well as other matters according to the wishes of the participants.
